74th Aldeburgh Festival of Music and the Arts

Music and place have always been at the heart of the Aldeburgh Festival and the 2023 Festival offers music, familiar and new, in the unique surroundings of Snape, Aldeburgh and other Suffolk settings.

Britten and Pears created the Festival with their friends in 1948, and composers & performers remain the driving forces of the planning. Four featured musicians — composers Anna Thorvaldsdottir and Cassandra Miller, pianist Pavel Kolesnikov, and baritone & composer Roderick Williams — have helped shape this year's Festival.

The Festival opens with a Britten Pears Arts commission and world premiere of Sarah Angliss' new opera Giant, telling the true, extraordinary story of the 18th-century "Irish giant" betrayed in the name of science.

There is so much to enjoy in the thrill of the Festival – eight string quartets, six orchestras, five exhibitions, four ensembles, three films, two operas, a centenary celebration of the composer Ligeti, dance and staged "concert theatre".

These two weeks in June will provide plenty of stimulation, enjoyment and reflection. We hope you will join us at the 2023 Aldeburgh Festival.

A brand-new opera from visionary composer Sarah Angliss, telling the story of the 18th-century "Irish giant" who was betrayed in the name of science.

"First do no harm", every doctor says. But what happens when a patient's body is so extraordinary that his corpse becomes an object of desire — a trophy? Giant tells the true tale of surgeon John Hunter and his obsession with Charles Byrne — a man he would ultimately betray in one of the most disturbing acts in the era of the grave robbers.

Written for five voices, Giant uses 18th-century instruments, live electronics and bespoke music machines as it vividly recalls the events surrounding Byrne's death: an extraordinary story that resonates through the ages.

A Line in the Sand

A song recital with a difference: words and music explode in an exploration of challenge and protest in art song.

Mention protest song to most people and they might well reach for their vinyl LPs of Bob Dylan or Nina Simone, or perhaps close their eyes, link arms and chant "We shall overcome". But to protest in song was not invented in the late sixties. Humans throughout history have used their singing voices to draw lines in the sand when other forms of objection have proved complicated. Classical art song abounds with examples, albeit in some unexpected places.

Music, poetry, prose and song by Schubert, Richard Strauss, Britten, Nadia Boulanger, Kit & the Widow and Errollyn Wallen is contextualised by readings from poet and performance artist Rommi Smith, who will be our guide through the maelstrom of debate, dissent, dissemblance and decency.

The Britten Song Trail is a choose-your-own adventure through the best of Britten's songs. Wind your way through the picturesque streets of Aldeburgh, taking in unusual performance venues including an art gallery, a distillery and a Victorian pumping station.

This unmissable event, a first in the history of the Aldeburgh Festival, places Britten's music in the centre of the town that he and Pears lived and worked in for so many years. Performed by outstanding international singers and instrumentalists from the Britten Pears Young Artist Programme, these intimate performances have been curated with their particular venues in mind.

The Trail is made up of individually booked short song recitals. We invite you to choose your route through the morning. Each performance takes place several times, and the venues are within a short walk of one another. Then the Song Trail culminates with everyone gathering together at Aldeburgh Church for the Finale performance.


